

# Houghton Hall Park September 2024 Newsletter

The Houghton Hall Park Renaissance and Renewal Project is being managed by Central Bedfordshire Council in partnership with Houghton Regis Town Council and was supported by the National Lottery through the Heritage Lottery Fund and the Big Lottery Fund.



What a September it has been already! The park team attended the Anglia in Bloom awards in Thetford on Friday 6<sup>th</sup> September, this was the first year Houghton Regis as a town had entered. Anglia in Bloom is an initiative that aims to improve and care for our local environment, Houghton Hall Park was entered in the Historic Parks and Gardens Category it was also nominated for a special award 'Best Home Grown'. To be nominated for a special award means that the project or scheme is one of a handful of the best in the Anglia region, and winning means it has been judges to be the best of the best!!

Anglia in Bloom judges visited the park on two occasions once as part of the judging of the Houghton Regis 'Large Town' category and then a second time to judge the park. The Houghton Hall Park team

and volunteers thoroughly enjoyed showing off all their hard work and what the park has to offer. Read Community Gardener Sue's update to see how we did!

Have you noticed the new interpretation board in front of Houghton Hall? To mark the contribution of the Brandreth family to the life of Houghton Regis from the 17<sup>th</sup> to the 20<sup>th</sup> century, the Houghton Regis Heritage Society have installed an information board in the park, setting out the history of the family in the town, together with the family tree. September's theme is: 'Close up of Leaves in Houghton Hall Park', the leaves are starting to fall and change colour so there is a lot you can do with this theme!



# What's happening in the gardens?

Hello all

It's September and the kitchen gardens are in full harvest mode now. We've finally had some rain after a dry August and this has given the autumn flowers in the formal gardens a much needed boost. Temperatures have dropped last week but hopefully will be back up again this week. We are not ready for autumn just yet!



Over the next few weeks we will be harvesting the remainder of our produce and selling it at the shop on Thursday mornings, along with donating some to our local foodbank. August has been warm and sunny after a dull July, so we have finally been able to see our tomatoes ripen and even a few aubergines. It has been a good

year for anything growing in the ground as we continue to harvest our over sized potatoes, beetro ot and a really good bean crop. We

do compare our harvests each year and we know the spring was a struggle for crops like strawberries because there just wasn't enough sun. We're also continuing to de-slug everything, those brown cigar shaped ones just keep coming!



We will carry out a proper review later in the autumn and it will help us decide what to grow next year. We are busy collecting seeds as we build a seed bank for next year.

Friday 6<sup>th</sup> September saw us attend Anglia in Bloom awards in Norfolk. We arrived in sunny Norfolk (after leaving stormy Central Bedfordshire) feeling rather nervous and unsure what to expect. It is the first year that the park and Houghton Regis town have entered this competition. The judges visited us back in July and it has been difficult to speculate how we did. Neil, Hayley and myself were joined by Bob, one of our volunteers at the event. We were thrilled to recive 2 awards, a Gold Award for the park in the category of "Historic Parks and Gardens". The second was a Special Award and we won our category of "Best

garden. An all round fantastic surprise and a reflection of how hard our volunteers work to make the gardens look wonderful all year round. Thank you to everyone who has helped, over the spring/summer around 50 different volunteers have helped me in the gardens, all making a contribution to the success of them. ## **Community Park Ranger Update**

Hello once again from the park, September already! The months are flying by, and the hot weather seems to be done with for the year.

I'm sure many of you have noticed that the wildflower meadow has been cut, it does seem a shame to cut flowers that are still in bloom but they were mostly at the end of their flowering season and going to seed. As our meadow has been established for a good few years it only needs cutting once a year to maintain it. Like pruning it can seem a bit OTT, but it will result in a healthier, more colourful meadow next year. The actual, physical cutting of the plants knock the seeds out of the heads and onto the soil. Cutting it will also expose any bare areas that the seeds will fall onto and germinate. The cuttings are removed otherwise they will feed the soil as they decompose, this will add nutrients to the soil which would benefit the grasses, but the flowers prefer less nutrient rich soils.

Our meadow has a good variety of plants growing in it, with the help of volunteers we managed to survey the whole meadow area before it was cut and identified 40 flowering plants and 6 different grasses!

Even though it has been cut flowers will still grow this time of year one of them being Common Toadflax (*Linaria vulgaris*) which will flower up until November, it has yellow snapdragon like flowers with orange streaks and can grow up to 75cm tall. These particular flowers attract Buff-tailed and White-tailed bumblebees, Common carder bees, Honeybees and a variety of

fly species.



A lot of the plants that I included in last months newsletter are still growing in various parts of the park plus a few that weren't so visible last month. Last week I saw a very colourful flower...Tree Mallow (*Malva arborea*). This flower has a bright pink/purple flower head and can grow up to 2m tall. It is more suited to coastal areas and not often seen this far inland. As a mostly coastal plant it has a very high tolerance to salt which it secretes through glands on its leaves giving it a great advantage over inland plants in its more preferred habitat.

Another plant popping up now is Charlock (*Rhamphospermum arvense*) another yellow, four petalled plant that can grow up to 80cm tall. I spotted this one by the newly planted trees by the visitor's centre, also known as Charlock mustard or field mustard.

The leaves of field mustard are edible at the juvenile stage of the plant, usually boiled. In 18th century Dublin, it was sold in the streets during the Great Famine of Ireland, wild mustard was a common famine food, even though it often caused stomach upset. Once the seeds are ground, they produce a kind of mustard.



While walking around the pathways in the park a lot of fruit baring trees are beginning to produce what will keep our birds alive during the winter months, Whitebeam, High bush Cranberry, Snowball, Rowan, Elder, Hawthorn... to name a few.

Throughout the year we have a conservation group that go out into the park to carry out various tasks every other Sunday, if anyone is interested in being part of our friendly team then don't hesitate in contacting me, I will let you know when our next outing is and what we will be getting up to.

#### **Nature Notes**


This last week has seen a drop in temperatures. Together with it getting darker earlier in the evenings is a sure reminder autumn not far off. In fact, the autumn equinox begins on Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup>.

Wildlife will be preparing now for winter, and I've noticed a big increase in the number of birds coming to the garden. The amount of food needed to top up the feeders each morning has also gone up by about fifty percent over the last month. If the cold weather persists, I will put out additional feeders to help them put on weight and fat reserves. Some of this extra feed is down to the gold finches who have been arriving in greater numbers of late. Early mornings and afternoons are the busiest with as many as thirty birds feeding at any one time. There have been signs of some having a late brood

as there have been young birds begging their parents to feed them. Although nowhere as numerous chaffinch numbers are also

up. Starling numbers are also high with fifty or sixty arriving each morning. If I'm late by as little as five minutes in putting the food out, they line up on the rooftops waiting patiently for breakfast. The main draw for them is the fat mix and mealworms. On seeing me some of the braver birds drop down into the apple tree to be first at the fat filled wooden block.

Then as I move away the noisy squabbling starts with a lot of


pushing and shoving. A pair of collard doves are spending more time in the garden spending long periods resting in the apple tree, in between feeding on food dropped from the feeders.

Last week a black squirrel arrived in my garden and may well become a regular visitor, as apart from one, I have seen it at least once every day since. It starts by investigating the wooden block I stuff with a fat-peanut butter mix. If empty, it roots around under the feeders with the rich pickings of sunflower heart pieces dropped by the finches feeding above.

Squirrels don't hibernate, although if the weather is bad, they may decide not to venture out every day. Eventually hunger forces them to look for food, so having places they can rely on to provide a meal is very important for them. Black
